Dear Members all over the world

What an extraordinary year this has been!

The resilience and resourcefulness of the dance world has led us to find new ways of teaching and examining through embracing and developing cinematography, technology and internet skills.

Teaching on-line is by no means ideal, but the 'silver lining' is that some teachers have been able to reach a wider audience in different countries and our students can at least continue their studies and keep developing their expertise during these difficult times.

Last July the SDS UK and Europe set up an on-line Store for our members and I am very happy to announce that the DVD that accompanies my book 'The Bolero School' has been carefully presented as a course of study and is now available in digital format for you to download and study at home. I hope you enjoy it and find it useful for your Spanish Dancing careers.

Below is something of what I wrote about the Pericet family in my book published by Dance Books Ltd, 2002:

"Having been passed on to each successive generation in the direct line, as taught by their grandfather, the Pericet method is all that remains of the exact steps and dances of the Escuela Bolera as it was in the 19th century. They thus go back to the first Angel Pericet (Carmona, 1877-1944) and his teachers of that era in Seville, Amparo Alvarez (La Campanera), so beautifully sketched by Doré, and Maestro Faustino Segura. Whether the changes of style and steps are changes for the better is a matter of debate. Should the style remain for posterity with rounded open arms, and a forward tilt of the body, or be allowed to evolve and therefore change?"

"The Pericet connection is by no means our only link with the Escuela Bolera, but it is the most direct link over the centuries. There are many other teachers of this classical school (mentioned in the following chapter) in Barcelona, Seville, Cádiz and Málaga. Maria Mercedes León, for example, speaks of her contact with the daughter of a teacher in Madrid called Maestro Roy and how he taught many more steps and certainly more intricate beaten footwork than found in the Pericet heritage. This could, of course, be Roy's own choreography." I then went on to deal with links between Cecchetti and the Escuela Bolera.

When Angel Pericet Jiménez, the father of my teacher Eloy Pericet Blanco, moved to Madrid in the 1940s he changed the Escuela Bolera style to compete with ballet, and taught it with upright arms, for which he was much criticised by the purists. However, other important teachers like Luisa and Rafael Pericet kept the original style.

Our preferred exam format is through video forwarded securely via We-Transfer, rather than zoom, due to the precarious reliance on internet connections.


To keep you informed of our activities since the Spring Newsletter I will list the events in chronological order.

We had a few trainees among us, and I would like to extend a warm welcome to Eleni Giannopoulou, Stella Pappa and Vasileios Skepataris from Greece and Cheryl Crossen White and Nuria Garcia from the UK.

We wish them all the best and a successful completion of their training.

At this point I would like to mention that the South African Executive Committee has unanimously decided to collaborate with us and offer the GQAL UK Government Accredited Route to the members that come under their jurisdiction. They will however also continue to offer the Original Syllabus route for those who want it. We are so glad and relieved that we are working together again and will be able to be in close contact with all our SDS members worldwide.




We have aimed to achieve a balance of challenging yet manageable Vocational Grades utilising all the Original exam material as well as adding new material, providing a rich variety of styles.




IN THIS EDITION WE ARE PRESENTING THE PROFILES OF YOUR REMAINING UK & EUROPEAN EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

CONCHITA DEL CAMPO

SDS UK and European Director and Organiser

Conchita del Campo was born into a Spanish dancing family. Her father Doroteo was a refugee from the Spanish Civil War and met her mother Margarita at the 'Hogar Español' in Bayswater London. Along with her elder brother Dorio, who later became a principal dancer with Houston Ballet, the family studied Spanish dancing for many years with the renowned teacher and excellent artist Lucile Armstrong. Eventually the family established their own dance group called 'Los del Campo' specialising in regional dances from the provinces of Aragon, Castilla, Valencia, Murcia and in the latter years Tenerife, one of the Canary Islands.

Conchita and Dorio started performing from the tender age of 6 in concert halls and theatres with their parents and various other well-known dancers of the era. They were both the first of six students of Leonie Urdang who arrived in the UK from South Africa to set up her Academy in North West London. They continued their professional dance training at the Arts Educational Trust School from the ages of 11 to 18. Dorio went on to perform classical ballet and settled permanently in the U.S.A.

Conchita continued dancing with 'Los del Campo', supporting their charitable events for the RSPCA and other animal charities, while also dancing professionally with Ballet Rambert, Ballet International, Scottish Ballet, Royal Opera Ballet Covent Garden, as a soloist in Münster Germany, and in Galas with Margot Fonteyn and Rudolf Nureyev. She was an 'extra' dancer for many years with the London Festival Ballet, and also a founder member of Harold King's London City Ballet. She partnered Wayne Sleep in his first 'Dash' company, assisted Anthony Van Laast in various films and TV shows, and after attending a choreographic course with Robert Cohan, founder of the London Contemporary Dance Company, she herself went on to choreograph for TV programmes, pantomimes, commercials, flamenco pop videos, and also created Spanish dances for festivals and for a short-lived West End musical.



In 1985 her parents organised a tribute to the Spanish King Juan Carlos and his wife Sofia at the Hammersmith Odeon to celebrate the unity of the Spanish people under the monarchy after many years of political unrest. The presentation included artists and friends Marisa Robles on the harp, José Luis Garcia on the violin, Paco Peña on guitar, Enrique Perez de Guzmán on Piano, and the dancer Maribel La Manchega in a Cuadro Flamenco with Antonio Vargas singing and Paco Peña and El Tito playing guitar. The Grupo de la Comunidad Gallega with Rafael Porro leading the Gaiteros also donated their services and enhanced the historic celebration.

It was while performing in Beirut with the Lebanese Caracalla Dance Company that Conchita started teaching Jazz, Contemporary and Classical Ballet.

This led her to apply and successfully achieve a professional dancers' teaching diploma in 1984 with the Royal Academy of Dancing in the UK, which led her to teach Pilates, Spanish and Classical Ballet as a full-time member for 29 years at the London Studio Centre theatre school in Kings Cross London.



During those 29 years her interest in health and fitness led her to become a Circuit Training Instructor, a Pilates Teacher Trainer for the Body Control Pilates Association, an examiner for the Pilates Foundation, a Reiki Master and a Cranio-Sacral Therapist.



It was in 1988 that she came across the work of the Spanish Dance Society (SDS). She was very impressed and immediately appreciated the value of the constructive and progressive syllabus and programme of study that it offered to students of all levels and ages, enabling them to be educated in the Regional, Classical and Flamenco styles of Spanish dance, and included within the theory papers the knowledge of the history, costumes and music.

She took over Victoria Ramos' school in Ladbroke Grove and soon started entering pupils for exams. By 1993 she achieved her SDS Maestro de Baile Diploma and in 1998 completed the training to become one of their International Examiners.

Conchita helped Robert Harold and Helen Wingrave with information for the new edition of their book 'Spanish Dancing' (2001), and helped proof read the Hon. Life President of the SDS Dame Marina Keet de Grut's book 'The Bolero School' (2002) as well as assisting her with the making of the video which accompanies the book. <https://vimeo.com/458199874/5f25e16c25>

Conchita's dedication to the SDS and loyalty to its founders, among them Dame Rhoda Rivkind, Sir Geoffrey Neiman and Dame Marina Keet, inspired her to take the helm and become one of the UK and European Directors alongside Nuria Garcia and Cheryl Crossen White a former colleague and fellow teacher.

With help from her esteemed advisors she found and established an excellent working relationship with Lee Clark from BDQT, and Helen Mence and Ivor James from the new, dance related awarding body GQAL so that the Society could maintain its UK government OFQUAL recognition status, and with the backing and support of her experienced, highly qualified and creative Executive Committee and Boards of European Examiners and Organisers she is confidently leading the Society towards an exciting future.

ALICIA ROSAS / CHERYL CROSSEN WHITE DIRECTOR AND EXAMINATION STANDARDISATION OFFICER

I was born in Dublin Ireland in 1956 and lived in the foothills of the Wicklow mountains for the first four years of my life, quite near the birthplace of Dame Ninette de Valois. She once attributed her creativity to her growing up in such fairy tale surroundings. I always understood that sentiment and would hear my own inner dance rhythms amplified in those surroundings as my Irish 'fiddle playing' grandfather never failed to be interested in whether I was, 'still leaping around?' So, it was a shock to my little four-year-old self to be torn away from my 'gypsy life' roaming around mountains and lakes and being the centre of my own imaginative stories, to boarding a very large 'boat' called the Pendennis Castle, on my way to somewhere called South Africa.



Little did I know that when we docked at some sunny palm tree lined country called 'Las Palmas', that I would be transfixed by a vibrant and colorful type of fairy tale that I could never possibly have imagined.

Watching the group of people who came on board the boat to dance for a 'hatful of pennies', changed my life. The sight of their beautiful dresses of velvet and silk as they jumped and leaped mesmerised me and when



more dancers came on with spotted dresses and colorful shawls making a sound that I had never heard before but recognised as rhythm, I resolved there and then that one day I would learn how to do that.

That opportunity came in 1965 when as a young 8-year-old RAD ballet student, at Gwen Dowell School of Dance, I saw one of her pupils dancing a 'classical Spanish' dance in a beautiful yellow lace dress to music by Granados.

I also fondly remember watching Jennifer Crew/Calix, who had just returned from dancing with Pilar Lopez in Spain perform a 'Soleares' in a stunning orange and black 'Cola' and begging my mother to allow me to join her Spanish Dance classes, where she taught the SDS syllabus in Krugersdorp.

On my first lesson with this wonderful, talented and shy lady I felt that I had found my 'fairy godmother'. She recognised that I too was shy but helped me to release my inner performer through the medium of this powerful and noble dance form. (I write this in tribute to her memory as she died of breast cancer a few years later). A great loss to the teaching world of Spanish Dance in SA.

I later auditioned and joined the JHB High School for Art, Ballet and Music as a student of Wilcarina Van Niekerk/Yeates. I consider myself enormously privileged to have trained under all these wonderful teachers including Marjorie Sturman, Ruth Inglestone, Jean Beckley, Dame Rhoda Rivkind, Mercedes Molina, Sir Geoffrey Nieman and Bernice Lloyd among many. Although Spanish Dance was my first love, I auditioned in 1973 for PACT Ballet Company and was accepted as an aspirant, although my heart was torn having been asked by Mercedes Molina to audition for her company.

I loved ballet but not enough to miss the opportunity of auditioning to replace a dancer who had to fly home to Spain with an illness from 'Los Tarantos'.

I joined Carmen 'La Terremoto', Lolita Paris and SA Spanish Dancers Manuel Bernal and Luis Mayo and guitarist Hiroshi Someya as a lead dancer on their tour of SA and surrounding countries.



I had regularly travelled to Spain and the UK to study and my association with José de Udaeta who taught at Cologne University started in 1972 when he first saw me dance at the age of sixteen and politely called me over at the end of the class to enquire who I had trained with. I explained that I had trained in South Africa with the SDS and he was amazed and said he had never seen somebody dance all three styles with such good understanding and knowledge. I was thrilled to give full credit to the SDS and told him that I would spread the word about his

Courses in Sitges and that he should, 'watch out, because we would be coming to conquer Spain!'. He threw his head back and laughed at my teenage presumptuousness, assuring me that Spain would welcome us.

To my delight this came true in 1990 when José and Sitges hosted the 25th SDS anniversary and to see dear Dame Marina Keet our Life President and all our lovely teachers from all over the world contributing to, sharing and promoting the art and knowledge of Spanish Dance for the benefit of all made me so proud to be associated with this wonderful Society.

Currently I run my own school in Kent and have had the honour of choreographing Spanish Dance for various institutions such as the Gulbenkian University Theatre and Chatham Theatre in Kent, promoting the Spanish Dance Society to many counsels, companies such as Eurotunnel and media including the BBC since 1982.

My Spanish Dance students themselves have won many accolades including the 'All England' dance competition twice. Others went on to become professional dancers and teachers throughout the UK. I have also taught dance in many English schools as a peripatetic dance coach and fully qualified supply teacher.

The Irish in me has always loved a good story and my admiration for Dame Marina Keet, who in her love for this unique and wonderful dance form has documented so much for future generations, knows no bounds. So when she asked me to help support and head up the new SDS board with the lovely and extremely hard working Conchita del Campo and Nuria Garcia, for UK and Europe I was honoured but most of all humbled, as I am so aware of all the hard work and years of 'blood, sweat and tears' that so many fabulous teachers have put in to this, 'beautiful baby', never should it be, 'thrown out with the bath water!'. I know that we all agree that even in these difficult days for all of us we have something so unique and special.

NURIA GARCIA

Director and Flamenco Advisor SDS

Nuria is one of 4 sisters born in Johannesburg, South Africa

She started Ballet dancing classes at the age of 3 and Flamenco classes with Gitanella at the age of 4. Her first SDS teacher was Theo Dantes and she started entering for exams when she was 7 years old. Nuria's mother was keen to enter her for dance competitions and on a memorable Festival Competition in South Africa Theo had choreographed a national dance for her which required a small loaf of bread as a prop. Just before her solo everyone was searching for the missing loaf and Nuria admitted she had eaten it because she was hungry!

While the entire family was holidaying in the UK Nuria, now age 11, was admitted into the All England Sunshine Competition and won the Cup for 1st prize in her division.



Nuria attended the Johannesburg High School for Art, Ballet and Music, during which time she was also taught flamenco and Spanish Dancing by Mercedes Molina, Rhoda Rivkind, Geoffrey Neiman and Florence Bonegio.

Her parents decided to emigrate to the UK in 1980 and Nuria continued her dance training after school hours at Stella Mann's Academy where she also successfully achieved a qualification as an Royal Academy of Dance teacher.

Her love of Spanish Dance led her to study in Spain with famous teachers including Manolo Marin in Sevilla, La Tati, Josele, Adrián Galia, and Antonio Canales in Madrid, and she proceeded to dance professionally with the avant-garde flamenco/contemporary dance group Von Magnet for 5 years, extensively touring Europe while also making several TV appearances. Subsequently she danced with many renown flamenco companies including Juan Martín's, Paco Peña's, Fiesta Flamenca and Grupo de Jerez, again touring Europe and performing in well-known theatres and the flamenco clubs Mouriños, Costa Dorada and Costa Brava.

In 1988 she took over the direction and flamenco training of the Escuela de Baile students when her sister Victoria decided to move to Jerez de la Frontera in Spain. She is currently the Head Teacher and Artistic Director, and it is now Britain's largest flamenco school.

Nuria's students have won several important dance awards including Greater London Arts 'Young Dancer of the Year' twice and were regional winners of the Barclays Youth Dance Award. Several students have won scholarships to full time dance schools and joined professional dance companies in Britain and noticeably the Javier La Torre and Israel Galván companies in Spain.

In 2017 her school won the Lucas Award for Best Flamenco School. Over the years she has taught Spanish dancing at Elmhurst Ballet School, Arts Educational Schools, workshops for the Sadler's Wells Theatre Flamenco Festivals, master classes at The Place in London, El Centro de Baile Jerez and as far afield as Thailand.



Her gift as a choreographer has led her to choreograph shows at the Peacock Theatre, The Hackney Empire and the Lillian Bayliss in London. She worked as Head Choreographer for advertisements for Sony, Nissan and Gypsy Kings. Videos for Souxsie and the Banshees, Miguel Galliaro, Robert Palmer and the Gypsy Kings. Her choreographies for theatre and opera companies have included Harvey Goldsmith's Carmen and Opera 80. Her creations for TV shows include About Face, Red-Hot and Blue, Music Makers and Strictly Come Dancing 2019.

She has appeared in documentaries about her work in Y Flamenco, Opening Shots and Capital Women.

Nuria really appreciates the invaluable training that the SDS gave her in her formative years. She encourages her students to do the classical and regional SDS exams as well as the flamenco parts because it teaches them the rich variety of Spanish culture and challenges and develops their physical skills and enhances their artistic knowledge.

Nuria met her partner Ivan Garcia at the bar Sevilla Mia and they now have two grown up children called Ana Belen and Ivan.

Jackie was born in South London and studied RAD ballet from the age of 4 and fell in love with dancing. At the McAlpine Ballet School she had the opportunity to be taught the SDS syllabus by Victoria Ramos and her sister Nuria Garcia. At the age of 14 she joined the children's company La Escuela de Baile and toured around London performing in shows, demonstrations, competitions and on TV.

Jackie completed the SDS teachers IdB1 and IdB2 at the London Studio Centre with Conchita del Campo and subsequently taught with her. At the same time, she completed the Advanced Russian Ballet exams and performed at the Sadler's Wells Theatre in Handel's opera "The Tempest", and several other Holland park operas during their summer seasons. She has also studied with Felipe de Algeciras and performed in the Vauxhall Peña.

Jackie has been teaching the SDS syllabus at the McAlpine Dance School in south London for over 25 years to children and adults. She also taught flamenco dance courses at: Morley College, Lambeth College, Lewisham Adult Education, City Lit and other south London schools. She supports her local community by sharing her SDS passion and love for flamenco by putting on performances, demonstrations, competitions, and entering students for SDS exams.

GARY WHITE - TREASURER AND LIAISON OFFICER

Gary was born in Glasgow to Scottish parents. His father worked for GSE Plessey in charge of putting in telephone exchanges Worldwide. They travelled extensively and Gary spent most of his childhood in Hong Kong, Malaysia, Australia and South Africa.

Gary studied Marketing and successfully achieved a Diploma in Management Studies at the University of Kent UK.

He met and married Cheryl Crossen while working for Barclays Bank in Johannesburg South Africa, and in 1978 they both settled in the UK where he worked for the Banque Brussels Lambert and then as Foreign Payments supervisor for Marine Midland Bank UK.

From Italy with Love - so needed in these virulent Pandemic waves - to you All.


Despite our Government decision to close and shut down the culture world because it's "not a priority" as they say, we go on believing how important Dance is for social life and for our psycho-physical balance.




